BE A READING ROLE MODEL

Being a role model for your child starts with

demonstrating a genuine love for books and making reading a visible part of your daily life.

Let your child see you reading for pleasure (it can be books, newspapers, audiobooks, online articles, etc. As long as you're reading!)

Talk about what you're reading, share interesting facts, and express excitement about books

Modelling positive reading behaviors encourages a similar attitude in young people

Research shows that young people with reading role models gain confidence in literacy and become more independent readers

Engaging in discussions about books and providing diverse reading materials suited to their interests makes reading an enjoyable experience, and will help nurture a lifelong love for learning and literacy
